


THE GREATEST FIRE on the Monterey Peninsula -- on September 14,1924 ... was started by lightning striking a crude oil storage tank on the 'tank farm', located where the Coast Guard Station stands today. Burning oil, boiling from the collapsing tank, spread the blaze to the nine other tanks and burned down five homes, two canneries, two warehouses and the oil wharf. Flaming oil spread out over the bay, threatening the fishing fleet and Old Fisherman's Wharf.

The first of many fire trucks to reach the scene was from the Pacific Grove Department, headed by Chief Roy Wright .... Foamite was unavailable at that time, and water played on the towering flames had no effect. It took three days for the fire to burn itself out, and the glare could be seen from as far away as San Francisco. Some 25 firefighters were lost, mostly soldiers from the Presidio.

When the fire started, an oil-field specialist from Arabia felt the side of the tank and warned, "This tank will generate enough steam to boil over in five minutes. Get everybody to high ground!" The crowds, and 300 soldiers, attempting to salvage hay from the warehouse, were moved up hill just

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# Something missing in P.G.'s churches

We don't hear it much anymore, but in the good old days we talked about Carmel by the Sea, Monterey by the Smell and Pacific Grove by God.

Let me hasten to reassure those from a later litter that the "smell" was a badge of distinction. Oh, sure, Gilroy, Hershey, Pa., and even Carmel Point at low tide have smells, but nothing like the Smell of Prosperity.

Ours was a pungent reminder of the bounty of the bay, that the purse seiners had filled their nets, spilled the catch into the hoppers off the Row, and everybody had work. The smell, of course, didn't stop at the city line and mixed with the plentiful P.G. fog. It settled and stayed in our hair, our clothes and our very souls.

Which brings me to P.G. by God.

You possibly didn't realize that God did, indeed, live in Pacific Grove. There are those who claim He still does, but a cruise through town suggests that maybe now, it's just on weekends.

When the magnificent Methodist-Episcopal Church, a cathedral really, was demolished, the town lost a big hunk of its heritage. My church-bell historian, Don Gasperson, and I well remember the Methodist church bell on Sunday mornings, and there must have been more bells, but memory fades like a bell whose duty is done.

The bells of Saint Mary's Episcopal, too. It should have been preserved as a national monument, just like the sand dunes should have been; or, at least, it should have been allowed to burn. But no, a wrecking ball, and away she went. If you didn't know, Chili Great Chili and other fine establishments took its place after years of an empty lot, forlorn and filled with trash.

But look, now, at what we have left. Those sacred symbols that our ancestors built with prayerful hands, hopeful hearts and the certainty that Pacific Grove would always be a land of promise and holy refuge. I wandered into Mayflower the other day — formerly Mayflower Congregational, but Presbyterian is now close enough — looked under the third pew on the right, thinking that my grandmother's footstool might still be there. It's not.

In those hallowed days, the minister ignored the subtle crackle of cellophane as grandmothers unwrapped peppermint drops for quiet kids. The church kitchen, like all church kitchens to this day, smelled faintly of natural gas. And those old churches all seemed to have wonderful cubbyholes, hidden rooms, nooks in the bell towers and exciting places to hide. Mayflower is the only church I know that had a real, live firing range in the basement.


And now down Central Avenue is Saint Mary's Episcopal, a religious experience just to step inside, an exact replica of a church in Bath, England. Across the street, the Christian Church, straight out of New England, and farther down, St. Angela's.

Evangelists loved Pacific Grove, with the highest conversion rate in the state. No matter how many times we were saved, another once

or twice couldn't hurt.

In those holy years, the town was dry as a bone. The thirsty sinners could march up Forest Avenue just across the line and patronize Dode's, or slip into New Monterey and then The Half Way House. When I suggested to my mother that Jesus had said something about wine being good for the stomach and that wine indeed was a miracle, she pointed out that wine in those days wasn't the same. And, at any rate, he said "a little wine."

Well, you may have noticed that things have changed in P.G. First printed in the Monterey Herald







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
# HOMES FROM HISTORY

The "Hart" in Pacific Grove's Hart Mansion is a nod to Dr. Andrew Jackson Hart, for whom the house was built in 1894. But "Mansion" is a bit misleading, conjuring images of a huge home with vast quarters, sequestered within a large estate landscaped around it. This house actually rises up like a white wedding cake on modest grounds in the middle of town.

Dr. Hart was the local obstetrician who delivered babies on the first floor of the house and raised his family upstairs. When he died, the house went to one of his two sons, also a doctor, and next, to his grandson, a dentist.

During the 1970s, the house was used as a restaurant, Maison Bergerac, and the chef and his family lived upstairs. As restaurants come and go, it was followed by Gernot's Victoria House and, ultimately, Robert Kincaid's White House on Lighthouse. And then it went up for sale.




Hart Mansion

Jim and Kathy Turley had dined in the big white house, had wandered by it many times from their home, a few blocks down the road. When the "for sale" sign went up, they wondered what kind of restaurant would come in next.

After the house had been on the market for a little more than two years, the Turleys considered its vacancy a tragedy and felt the sadness in the still structure as they walked by. Their only hope for consolation, they realized, was to buy it.

"The house, an 1894 Queen Anne Victorian, is just gorgeous, " said Jim. "In working on the house to do minor repairs, I found it was constructed of beautiful quality redwood, even in parts one would never see. The ceilings, hand-plastered, are 12- to 14-feet high."

An iconic Victorian in town has joined the Historic tour this year - the 1902 Victorian-era mansion built as a residence for banker J.J. Osborne and occupied, since 1961, by Beacon House residential and outpatient treatment facility.

Designed by renowned architect William H. Weeks, the house is an alchemy of Colonial Revival detailing and Victorian styling. Through the largesse of Samuel F.B. Morse, founder and president of the Pebble Beach Co., Beacon House was able to acquire the house to the benefit of the community.

"So many people see this beautiful building and don't actually know what it is or what we do at Beacon House," said case manager Carollee Edmonds, who has had two historic homes on the tour. "Because it is a house and not a commercial building, we have kept it a home atmosphere where people can feel they are among family."

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Gerald Leland Hogg, who spelled his last





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# 'All he wanted to do was play music'

Pacific Grove ties to Glenn Miller and his music through his brother, Herb Miller By Dixie Layne '66

It is with excitement and fond memories many of us will file into Pacific Grove's Performing Arts Center on Thursday evening, November 1, to hear the distinct sounds of the Glenn Miller Orchestra. People of all ages from around the world can identify the sonic keynote of the Glenn Miller Orchestra—lead clarinet over four saxophones. We are thrilled this big band sound is returning to Pacific Grove where residents from 1944 to 1980 had a special connection with Glenn Miller's music through his brother Herb Miller. Herb brought his own musical talent to the Monterey Peninsula, first to Fort Ord as part of the 59th Army Band then to Pacific Grove as music teacher and band leader.

While Herb was stationed at Fort Ord, he and his young family lived in a house at 16 Second Street in Pacific Grove because it had a living room large enough for the entire band to rehearse. Herb's son, John, remembers when the soldiers came to their home December 1944 to tell Herb his brother, Army Major Glenn Miller, was "missing in action". Glenn Miller was flying from England to entertain the troops in Paris when his plane went missing over the English Channel. No trace of the aircrew, passengers or plane have ever been found. Glenn Miller's status is "missing in action".

After Herb was discharged from his military service in 1946, he and his family remained in Pacific Grove where he found employment teaching math and instrumental music in the public schools. It was around 1950 when Herb purchased the lot at 25 Asilomar Boulevard and built a home for his family with lumber he reclaimed from a Fort Ord barrack they tore down. He used every piece of it to build the home, which no longer stands; however, the structure that currently occupies the spot is built upon the half-basement the Millers constructed so well it may never be removed.

Herb Miller was assigned a permanent position at Pacific Grove Jr. High School (Middle School) in the


early 1960's. During this time that I played clarinet in the school's band and orchestra. I remember he was so nice and soft spoken —a Nebraska born and bred gentleman. During his tenure as a teacher he organized his own band to help keep his brother's music alive, all the while developing his own style. He played for private and public events at a number of venues on the Peninsula, including the Mark Thomas Inn (Hyatt Regency Monterey) and a special performance on the beach during Pacific Grove's Feast of Lanterns in 1958.

Herb retired from teaching in 1970 and "joined the circus" –his son John tells me that's what musician's call playing in a band. John explains that all his dad ever wanted to do was play music. John is a graduate of Pacific Grove High School and "joined the circus" himself in 1974 as the band's ringmaster.

In 1980, Herb was invited to England to guest with a band -he accepted and asked his son to come along as the band's singer.

Herb led the Herb Miller Orchestra and traveled Europe and Asia until he "checked-out" in September 1987. John, "Herb was cremated

and his ashes scattered off the coast of England with 800 people in attendance. He was highly thought of by musicians and much loved by audiences." John has continued in his father's footsteps - keeping the Glenn Miller music alive. The Herb Miller Orchestra, now the John Miller Orchestra, continues to play throughout Europe and Asia: www.JohnMillerOrchestra.com

\$150.000 Loss: Will Rebuild June 21, 1951

Fires destroyed the Grove Theater Building on Lighthouse Avenue, early this morning. The Greyhound depot and the physicians' offices on the corner also were included in the loss. The alarm was turned in at 2:51 a.m. with eight pieces of fire equipment responding to the blaze. Two trucks came from the

# Forestry Fire Station while Monterey sent three to assist. **ORIGIN UNDETERMINED**

Fire Chef Vic May was unable to conclude what had started the fire, since the building was still too hot (9:00 a.m.) To investigate fully. However, he was sure it was not the projection room.

May said, "When we entered the first time, the smoke was so thick, one could hardly see, but there was a great deal of flame in the front of the stage."

There were no injuries incurred during the fire.

Mark G. Keller, president of the Monterey Theater Company, owners of the property, estimated a building loss of \$15,000. He said that as soon as the insurance adjusters have completed their survey, and the engineers can enter the site, plans will be drawn to rebuild.

Keller said, "It is, of course a great financial loss to us, but it is also a loss to Pacific Grove, and we will go ahead immediately on a new and better theater.

Doctors, Richard Hane and A.J. Herrman, whose offices were at the corner of Sixteenth and Lighhouse are looking for a temporary location this morning, and will announce their openinh in a later edition.

John Stewart who operates the Greyhound agency and magazine shop suffered a severe loss in merchandise.





Can anyone out there help me? Joanie


# **Chief Miller Retires**

They were looking for wood for a pregame rally tonight on the high school field. Spotting a cozy-looking small wooden structure, the boys, still nonchalantly, piled it on to their truck.

The small wooden structure might have been called, in the days of your grandfathers, an outhouse, or maybe a two-holer.

Safely back in Pacific Grove the boys deposited their treasure, when, getting ready to go after more wood, they found themselves some more good company in the form of the Monterey police. They went to the station. Who should be there but the man who owned the mentioned and yet unmentionable small wooden structure. He wanted cash. No, he didn't want the old thing. He wanted money. No, he wouldn't let the boys bring it back. Either they paid the \$25 or a warrant for arrest on charges for petty theft would be issued.

A little wiser now, the boys are pretty sure the next time they find a nice big chunk of wood, such as a a small wooden structure, they will break it down into such tiny little pieces that people who are old enough to remember won't recognize it.

## The rest of the story.....

I must have heard this story 100 times over the years but never saw the newspaper article that is on the previous page. While going through papers of my Dad's I came across it. I couldn't resist putting it in the KOII.

I can't name all of the boys involved, but for sure these names pop into memory. My Dad, Bill Hyler '39 and his brother Bob '40. Bud Giles '39, Wayne Bennett '39, Bill Giles '37, Keith Davison '39, to name a few.

The story goes that the truck they borrowed to get this outhouse was from a local lumber company and, though the truck was perfect in that it was a flat bed, they didn't count on the owner of the outhouse catching them by reading who owned the truck through advertising of the lumber company on the side!

It took a while before they figured out how they had gotten busted. Now, \$25.00 today does not seem like much, but in 1938 that would calculate to \$416.67 in 2013, and that is a lot.

The "lady" and or "true Friend" was none other than my grandmother, Elmarie *Hurlbert* Hyler Dyke '15.

If anyone else out there can share anything more about this story I sure would appreciate it.

Just a note that the old swimming pool is now gone and a new one being dug as I type.

The old pool was an "L" shape with the diving well jutting off to the side of the six lane pool. We are now building an almost-square 25 yard by 25 meter pool with ten lanes and two diving board. There will be a small shallow area jutting off to the side where the entrance used to be. Otherwise, the pool will essentially be 7 feet deep in most areas except for the diving area which will be 13 feet. We are anticipating completion in December.

# 48 YEARS of PGHS BREAKERS CLUB

This long-lasting club stems from times supporters of PGHS Sports enjoyed opportunities of working together.

During the more than three (3) years of actual volunteer labor by "The PGHS Stadium Fund Committee" and others erecting lights and bleachers on Breaker Stadium, every weekend and holiday the men worked the ladies would bring them lunch.

Soon all unanimously felt they would like to continue helping the PGHS Sports Department and were looking for a way to do this. So, in September 1965, the late Jane Russo and Wynette *Walker* Cowen '41 arranged with Principal Rex Dunipace for a room at the high school and invited ALL to join them. With very little discussion the Breakers Club was born that very night. They were warned at the time that it would never last, but here we are so proud that we've proven those "nay sayers" wrong, and it's still going strong after 48 years.

The first president of the club was Mal Silveira '41. Soon the membership grew to represent more than 100 families. Their first donation was \$248.00 the exact amount the "Stadium Fund Committee" needed to clear "their plate" and in February 1967, that committee gifted the completed stadium to the PGUSD free and clear. In 2001, PGUSD officially named it "Howard Cowen Breaker Stadium." In those first years, the club was able to present PGHS athletes 16 MPC (Monterey Peninsula College) scholarships; held 10 awards banquets, and much more.

As new projects continued to come up, the need for a permanent Projects Chairman was obvious so Richard Stillwell '50 and Howard Cowen '41 were chosen to share this responsibility. They chaired these club projects for many years together and worked with other groups such as the original snack bar and restrooms aided financially by the PGUSD and the swimming pool bleachers aided financially by the PGHS PTA.

Other projects were the original announcers booth; baseball batting cage, field fencing and scoreboard on the baseball diamond - officially named "Don Curley Field" by the PGUSD in 2003; athletic equipment shed; pole vault and high jump pits; added storage area to the boys' locker room, and so much more. In fact, too many to list here.

In September 1976, the founding members who had been extremely active felt the need for new leadership. At the time, the Monterey Peninsula Herald sports editor, Bob Bullock, quoted in his daily column: "To lose such invaluable cooperation between the school (PGHS) and the club (Breakers) for lack of leadership would be a great loss to the Monterey Peninsula sports scene." New leadership - involving three generations - quickly took over to keep it growing and have it continue to be active to this very day.

During the next number of years the club was constantly working to aid the PGHS sports department whenever and however possible. When the importance of recording the history of the club was realized, records such as the original by laws, past president lists, past project list, etc. was gathered. In the early 90s they started organizing and collecting an

immense amount of memorabilia (innumerable years of pictures, sports blankets, sweaters, and awards, the vaulting pole Lowell "Steeley" Todd '32 used when he won the State Meet - and more) they used these items to artistically display them in a room at the school for a few years until that room was needed for classes. Sadly, most of this is now in storage. A plan is in the works for a time capsule in the stadium on their 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2015.

In around 1982 Head Football Coach Hal Nelson wanted to relight Breaker stadium so the school district told him he needed to raise a portion of the money. A committee was formed called B.U.L.B.S. (Breakers United Light Breaker Stadium). There were different ideas as how to raise the money The club excepted the responsibility of planning an annual "Shoe" Dinner/Dance BBQ about 1986 with Master BBQ'er Charlie Higuera '53. The first 2 to 3 years all the money raised went to the relighting of the stadium. The dinner/dance has been held immediately preceding the PG-Carmel football game ever since. This along with a huge auction (both live and silent) rates second only to the current snack bar in financing so much of the PGHS sports programs. Items for these auctions are donated by dedicated individuals and businesses, supporting the Breakers Club.

Archie's American Diner (in The Tinnery) started partnering with the club for "Archie's Night" by donating ½ of the proceeds from dinners purchased that night with pre-sold tickets.

It wasn't long before the Breakers Club reached an agreement with PGHS to solely work the Snack Bar ("Stillwell's Last Stand") with all proceeds going to the PGHS sports department. Staci Consiglio, president since June 2009, has been overseeing the many dedicated concession volunteers who give their all so willingly every time it's open. This includes stocking, planning menus, working the counter, cleaning up etc. Since being moved down to the new stadium it's open for ALL scheduled activities. The club was able to give \$10,000.00 to athletics each year for many years. Then it was raised to \$25,000.00 until 2012. That year was a very good year, so they were able to give \$5,000.00 more right off the bat. Now more than \$30,000.00 is given each year.

Among some of their numerous other gifts is a cart, including upkeep, for field set-up and moving snack bar supplies; a 30 foot storage container with a foundation at the rear of the new stadium, and new portable BBQ to support the concession.

The group also actively supports the "TRANSFORMATIONAL C O A C H E S o f M O N T E R E Y C O U N T Y" http://www.transformationalcoachesmc.com/ in their efforts to promote positive coaching and positive sports parenting.

The club meets the second Tuesday or Wednesday of every month except July in the PGHS Student Union. Membership is offered on different levels to PGHS sports fans - parents, faculties, administrators, alumni, local businesses, etc.

One of the most famous land marks was the motor court at the corner of 17 Mile Drive and Sinex. The 17 mile Drive Cottage Court was not only was advertised as a "First Class Modern

Resort" which was close to the beach but it was home to many people during WWII. In its early years it was the largest motor court on the west coast.

Fred Workman his wife Nell and his two sons Ralph and William lived on the north east corner of 17 Mile Drive and Sinex. Their family home still stands.

Fred Workman had purchased the property across the street which was vacant in 1925 and proceeded to build the cottage court. In 1940 he expanded the facility to include mobile homes.
