

Our travel days are over, but we have a lot of wonderful memories. Dear Beth:

I don't know why I didn't realize that there was an alumni association before now. It occurred to me the day before yesterday. I will indeed register at this late date. I sympathise with your health problems as I walk with a cane these days. A short bio: I graduated from P.G.H.S. in June 1962. After that I was supposed to go active in the United States Naval Reserve, but was disqualified because of asthmatic bronchitis. I worked a few local jobs: steakhouse in Carmel, Los Laureles Lodge in Carmel Valley, Ray's Enco in Marina. When my grandfather died I moved to Indiana to care for my grandmother. I went to Indianapolis Technical Institute to learn computer programming, which started a 44-year career as a Mainframe Software Developer. I worked for several corporations and moved about the country: Indianapolis at RCA Records; Blue Cross & Blue Shield; Phoenix, AZ at the Arizona Bank; Portland, OR at First Interstate Bank; Back to Phoenix at Motorola; Hoover, AL at AmSouth Bank (now Regions Bank); Seattle, WA at Washington Mutual Bank (now Chase Bank). The 2008 Housing bubble forced me into retirement. I moved back to Indiana and Earned an Associate's Degree in Fine Arts and a Certificate in Business Administration. If our finances hold out and my health permits, I plan to visit Pacific Grove in 2025. However, speaking of health, I need to inform as many people as I can that uncontrolled diabetes can result in damage to the kidneys that might lead to dialysis. About three years ago I started itching all over my back, down my arms, and in my scalp. When I reported this to my healthcare providers, they gave this information no importance. I believe that the itching should have caused special attention to my kidneys. If I had maintained control of my diabetes I might not be facing dialysis now. Kidney damage is unrepairable. Heed your symptoms and consult closely with your physician.

Maria "Ria" Lena Langton Turnbow, 75, of St. Louis, MO, passed away unexpectedly on January 11 in St. Louis, MO. Ria was born on August 27, 1948, to the late Warren Langton and Lena Grolimund Langton in Regensburg, Germany, while her father was serving there in the U.S Army. She gradu-

ated from P.G.H.S. in 1966 after stays in Seattle and Waynesville, MO, and then earned an AA at MPC and a BA in early childhood development at Pacific Oaks College. She always considered P.G. to be her true home, and she loved it dearly. Although Ria and Jerry had no children of their own, she was the beloved "TiaRia" to several generations of nieces and nephews on both sides of their families. Ria obtained an AA in general studies at MPC. She then spent a year at San Francisco State University (preschool education and social studies), and finally two years at Pacific Oaks College, earning a BA in early childhood development. Kenneth Raye Murray was born in Monterey on February 11, 1964, one of seven children. He was



# **Classic Bowhay**

All cities, towns, and villages have their own sets of sounds. Not like a thumbprint, exactly, but when you work up in the morning and heard the soft, sonorous sibilance of the surf, or the low moaning of the fog horn, or the ringing of the bell buoy, you remembered you were back home in Pacific Grove.

In Monterey it was the gulls, and in the good old days, the cannery whistles. In Carmel, of course, there were the mission and monastery bells on Sunday morning.

This is all well and good, but without some punctuation, you might have thought yourself in Santa Cruz or Santa Clara. Our punctuation was the fire horn.

Mounted on top of City Hall, which was also the fire station and police department in those days, it was part of our identity, our heritage, and our signature sound, unlike anything else in Western civilization. It was harsh and raucous, insistent and serious in intent. Its primary purpose was to alert and call the volunteer firemen, day or night, rain or shine. During World War II, it called us all to air raid and/or blackout drills, and that is another story.

Noon, every day, was announced with two blasts: Twelve o'clock, Nellie! We've made it through another day!"

It was always exciting for out-of-town guests to hear it for the first time. Some thought it woke the dead and killed the living. Not true, of course, but I'll tell you this: Damn few pigeons or gulls stayed on City Hall.

It must be recalled that in those days the Rec Center, a high school hangout, was on Forest Avenue, right across from City Hall. One moonlit night a friend of mine was dancing—"String of Pearls"—with a pretty little honey from Chowchilla, Sweet 16 and all the rest. They stepped outside for a breath of air, and he asked if he could kiss her. Unable to speak, she nodded yes, and as he planted his lips to hers, the horn, maybe 50 feet away and heard 50 miles away, blew!

At first, trembling in his awkward grasp, she thought that sound, which indeed did shake her teeth, was part of the kissing experience. At the second and third blast, however—there was a house fire down by Caledonia Park—she realized this was *God*! She burst into tears and did not kiss again until her freshman year at San Jose State.

The horn was part of the fine volunteer tradition in Pacific Grove. We all had posted in our homes the code telling us the approximate location of the fire. "One, One, Three," Forest and Lighthouse, and there was a chalkboard in front of the station with the address of the blaze.

Most of us are pulled to witness the drama of a fire, even firemen off duty. My dad, and Brooks, both firemen, were the first out the door, followed by me, Mike, Shirley, and Tom, Dad calling, "Let's see if they can save the lot!" (Fireman humor.) Often false alarms, but the two world-class blazes, Pacific Grove High School and the Grove Theater, are never to be forgotten.

Having drifted away from the sounds of the "Last Hometown," best now to point out that the horn is gone, with other means at hand to call the ladies. And 12 o'clock noon is now verified by the chimes, which sometimes causes a visiting matron from Chowchilla to smile—and that, too, is another story.



While this article isn't about our foghorn, it starts and ends with that memory. The foghorn has only recently been memorialized with a plaque on a rock across from the foghorn's location, above. The plaque reads "Point Pinos Fog Signals, 1925-1993. It was in this area that the first electric siren began operating in 1925. It was followed in 1945 by a foghorn which provided an audible warning of rocks and other dangers to shipping. The last signal was deactivated in 1993." 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## **'22 Grad Signs with U of Memphis** By John Devine

Cy Turner's path to college baseball was unorthodox, filled with unforeseen barriers that left the '22 P.G.H.S. grad without a place to play baseball during



his senior year. Clearing those hurdles with two productive springs at MPC warranted attention, yet not necessarily what Turner, pictured at left in his Lobos uniform, had hoped for — at least in the beginning. That is until recruiters at the University of Memphis stopped by to look at a teammate of Turner's. "One of the comments by the recruiter on his

visit was 'why didn't you tell us about your third baseman?'" said Turner's dad Jared. "It validated his work." Turner signed with the U of M Tigers in May.

When California shut down high school sports in 2020-2021 because of the pandemic, Turner and his dad moved to Kansas, where he played baseball during his junior season in 2021. With students returning to the classroom in California full-time for the 2021-22 school year, the Turners decided to move back to P.G. so he could play with his twin brother for his senior year. However, because the move wasn't deemed a family move, and it was the second move within a school year, the Central Coast Section ruled Turner ineligible to play baseball, ending his high school career. "I put that in the rearview mirror for the most part," Turner said. "I wasn't going to let it affect who I am. It served as motivation. I never thought that I was done playing baseball."

What Turner wanted to accomplish during his two seasons at MPC was improve his confidence at the plate, while making up for a year of inactivity. He's used those seasons to add muscle to a 6-foot-3 frame, climbing to 185 pounds, while making countless trips to the batting cage. "I was worried (being ruled ineligible) would prevent Cy from achieving his ultimate goal of playing at the highest level," said Jared Turner. <sup>20</sup>

"It ended up working out."

While injuries cut into Turner's spring, the left-handed slugger still drove in 35 runs in 38 games for the Lobos, compiling a .380 on-base percentage with four homers. His patience at the plate saw Turner draw 22 walks – second on the team. He also stole 12 of 15 bases and compiled a .938 fielding percentage at the hot spot. "He was up and down this spring at the plate," said Jared Turner. "But Cy had big moments in front of schools and college recruiters."

"Other than taking a couple of pictures of Graceland, I know little about Memphis," Turner said. "Recruiters came to recruit a couple of our guys. I became one of them." So it will be sight unseen when Turner arrives in the fall. "The main thing was probably feeling more comfortable as a hitter in the box," Turner continued. "I could pick and choose a lot of things that I've improved upon. But that's what stood out to me."

Having displayed more power at the plate, Turner sprayed the ball all over the field, with nearly half his hits this past spring going for extra bases. "I could be a power hitter," Turner said. "I'd say I'm a little bit of everything. I would like to get a little stronger and transform my body to compete at the next level." Spending two seasons at MPC enabled Turner to mature off the field and grow into his body on the field, creating another path in his journey to play Major League Baseball. "There have been a lot of key moments for me in my development as a student and an athlete," Turner said. "I loved my time at MPC. It's done a lot for me."


