"As stated above, this paper is being published in the interests of the high school and for the promotion of school spirit. Our motion is to put the punch in school life.' This isn't a money-making establishment. We will consider ourselves fortunate if we break even. "We are intending to make the paper exclusively for the high school. Nothing but high school news, or news directly concerning the high school will be published. We see no reason why our school ananot have just as good a weekly as any other school and we shall try and give it one. If you will boost the paper in every way you can, we will do our very best to make it a thing for the school to be proud of. Thanks!"




Born on May 26, 1931, in King City to Marie Garcia and John Conlan, **William**

Fort Ord, the Naval Postgraduate School, and Vandenberg Air Force Base. A good number of beautiful, custom homes on the Monterey Peninsula have his Carmel Valley Electric stamp on them. when he adopted Lynda's two daughters. As a father of six, he continued to be involved in each of their lives. Bill and Lynda shared fifty years together, running the family business and traveling with the kids. 

## Sandi Eason '74 Does It All



Sandi *Dix* Eason's lifelong goal has been to do it all. And, on a daily basis, she pretty much achieves it. Raised in Pacific Grove, Eason, at left, graduated from P.G.H.S. in 1974 and went on to secure a parttime job as a bank teller. "I didn't go on to college," said Eason. "After start-

ing as a teller at Wells Fargo in Monterey, I ultimately spent 36 years at Wells and am now COO of Pacific Valley Bank in Salinas." She is also a bit of a legend when it comes to selling raffle tickets.

United Way Monterey County is one of eight local nonprofit organizations chosen to raise funds by giving donors the opportunity to win a car provided by Concours d'Elegance sponsors each year during "Car Week" on the Peninsula, this year August 9-18. Each organization has run a summer-long campaign, selling \$100 tickets, whose proceeds go directly to the charity. The highly anticipated drawing for cars will take place during the Concours d'Elegance show on Sunday. This year's prize was a 2023 Lincoln Corsair. Last year, Eason sold an unprecedented 30 tickets to the drawing, generating \$3,000 in support of United Way. She also sold the winning United Way ticket. This year, she raced up and over her record by selling 70 tickets, bringing in \$7,000 to the organization.

"In my nine years of selling tickets, I have shattered the all-time individual record for tickets sold," said Eason, "and I'll be excited to hear who wins the Lincoln Corsair. But when I sell tickets, I focus, not on winning the car, but on giving back to our community through the wide reach of United Way. I mean, only one person, out of the 70 tickets I sold, plus all the tickets sold by other United Way team members, will win the car. It's important for the rest of us to come away feeling good about supporting our community." Health Foundation and Seneca Central Coast took a chance on a 2023 Infiniti QX60 Luxe AWD. Montage Health Foundation and My Museum ticket holders bid for a 2023 Mercedes Benz GLA250. Boys and Girls Clubs of Monterey County and Rancho Cielo sold tickets for the opportunity to win a one-year lease on a 2023 Lexus LC 500 Convertible, plus a one-day pass to attend the Lexus Performance Drive School at Laguna Seca, a two-night stay at a Pebble Beach Resort, and a "Twosome" at Pebble Beach Golf Links.

Eason had been working for Wells Fargo for 29 years, when the founder and CEO of Coast Commercial Bank tapped her on the shoulder and asked her to take over as CEO.

"He said, 'This isn't an interview. We're here to talk you into taking the job.' It was," she said, "an opportunity I couldn't pass up. Once Wells Fargo acquired us, I was back with Wells for seven more years before moving to Pacific Valley Bank."

But that's just her career track. Eason lives in a single-family house, but her home is the entire community. And her hometown support, which runs alongside her work, ransoms even more of her time and talent. Not only is she the current president of "Impower," which supports girls and women, but she also just completed a nine-year run on the Board of Directors for United Way Monterey County, the past two years as Board Chair. Among involvement in other charitable organizations. "Community involvement has been my lifelong passion," Eason said. "Banking is a stimulating career, which pays the bills, and I love it as well. But I have been heavily involved in nonprofit support my whole life. This is where we get to know people, how we become part of our community, where we can make a difference in the quality of our lives."

"The Concours d'Elegance brings the most expensive cars and elite audience members in the world into this community," said Eason, "and yet we have residents here who cannot afford to put food on their table. United Way endeavors to bridge that gap, to reach everybody. We're grateful to the Concours d'Elegance and their sponsors, who are helping us achieve that."

## '05 Grad Opens Jazz Fest

Local bassist Zach Westfall, 36, made his debut as a bandleader at the Monterey Jazz Festival in September; his Zach Westfall Quartet had the honor of opening the 2023 Monterey Jazz Festival with its first set.

Westfall also just released a new recording with his quartet, saxophonist Ben Herod, guitarist Adam Astrup, and drummer Mike Shannon, titled "Live at Pearl Hour." It's a big, first step forward in solidifying Westfall's goals of building a serious career as a jazz artist. "I remember saying when I was 19 or 20 years

old that my No. 1 dream as a musician was to be able to lead a band at the Monterey Jazz Festival," he said.

Westfall has played in a variety of local bands, including The Money Band, the Ben Herod Trio, and The BASSment Band. For the better part of three years, he played with veteran

Peninsula pianist Bob Phillips. "That was a big part of my development, too," he said. "I pretty much have played in every local band. I don't say this in a cocky way, but I've literally played with almost every musician on the Monterey Peninsula."

Westfall is also a member of retiring Jazz Festival Director Tim Jackson's band when that group plays at places like the Big Sur River Inn on Sundays. His connection with Jackson is proving to be an important aspect to Westfall's quest to branch out around the region and beyond.

"I've been playing in Tim's band for about three years now," he said. "I'd say he's one of my biggest fans, which is really touching for me. He's always been one of my biggest supporters."

Another major supporter is the owner of New Monterey's Pearl Hour bar, Katie Blandin. She's been instrumental in establishing Westfall as a bandleader, allowing him to hold down a permanent Sunday night slot with the quartet, where they've spent the last two years honing their communication skills and putting together the album that was recorded live at the cocktail bar.

Westfall was born in Hot Springs, Arkansas, and moved to Pacific Grove when he was 1. He considers himself a late-blooming musician. He said he didn't pick up an instrument until he was probably around 14, and then he started really playing when he was a junior at P.G.H.S. It was his friend Trevor Larkin who started the ball rolling while the two were sitting around watching MTV, the music video television

> channel. He declared that the two of them would start a rock band, choosing the guitar for his own instrument and basically foisting the bass guitar on Westfall. Larkin didn't stick with it, but Westfall did. He spent a lot of time noodling around in his room, trying to figure things out on his own. "And then I was sitting

around during a lunch break at P.G. High in my junior year and Dave Hoffa, the music teacher, asked me if I wanted to join the jazz band because they needed a bass player. That was the beginning of the whole thing."

After graduating from P.G.H.S. in 2005, Westfall attended Berklee College of Music in Boston and lived on the East Coast for 11 years. He worked as a freelance bassist and toured with various groups throughout the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom and Japan.

Westfall's mother, longtime Peninsula resident and artist Deborah Kaye, has been a constant supporting force in his life, and his stepdad Mike Lent, a professional musician, has also been helpful as an advisor in the finishing touches on the album. Although Lent was not a force in Westfall's musical development, he has been helpful in imparting "some valuable wisdom and in offering great advice for all of us," Westfall added.

# Breaker Football Builds a Foundation

Sharing athletes from other sports is often encouraged at small schools. The challenge for P.G. lately has been finding enough bodies to put a competitive product on the field, which it has. With enrollment under 600 students, the Breakers usually have a roster hovering around 24 to 28 players on a good day.

"Honestly, we looked pretty thin over the summer," Pacific Grove linebacker Pete Gamecho said. "Then people just started showing up." While most are multiple sport athletes, with football not being their primary sport, a resurgence had 37 players this fall. "There was a lot of juggling this summer," coach Jeff Gray said. "We were trying to make coaches happy from baseball to lacrosse and basketball. We were spread pretty thin."

So much so that P.G. was the only one in the county that did not do 7-on-7's in the summer with other schools in the Pacific Coast Athletic League. "With the uncertainty of players having commitments to other sports, it wouldn't be worthwhile for us," Gray said. "But we're in the weight room each morning."

Piecing together a team means simplifying systems. Discipline and execution remain front and center in maintaining a system that keeps the Breakers competitive. "We're trying to bring that culture back for football," Gamecho said. "We want that student body section filled this season."

"We have guys with a lot of heart," Gray said. "But we don't want to be the school that just has heart. We are trying to find a group that will put us over the edge."

Losing 13 seniors from last year's 5-5 team constituted a retooling this fall for the Breakers. With the Cypress Division merging with the Mission Division, the Breakers are in a division with rival Carmel (the "Shoe" game this year was Carmel 42, P.G. 21), along with defending Mission Division champion Soledad, as well as Alisal, who was in the Gabilan Division last year. "We have some solid kids coming up," Gray said. "I feel good about this group. I feel even better about our depth. If we're healthy, we'll be right there." out yards and chews up the clock. "We perform at a high level. We're more aggressive this year," said Gamecho. The return of Gideon Llantero gives the Breakers a punishing back for Gamecho to block for with deceptive speed in the open field, having rushed for nearly 800 yards last fall. Llantero piled up a career-high 187 rushing yards in one game and added 12 catches out of the backfield.

If the Breakers are deep at one position, it's in the backfield as Jacob Booker and his 500-plus rushing yards and team-leading six touchdowns have returned, while Ben Garry is another viable option. And Gray has developed a capable quarterback in Nathaniel Wade. Wade completed nearly 70 percent of his passes for just under 1,000 yards as a sophomore last year. his presence behind center will force opponents to respect the passing game, particularly with pop passes to the tight end, as well as getting the ball deep downfield.

While the depth on the offensive line is always a concern with a small roster, Gray has two cornerstones to build around in Ryan Bell and Gamecho. "Those two guys are smart," Gray said. "It's like having two coaches on the field. Both come from a coaching family." The pair were a big part in Pacific Grove chalking up over 2,000 rushing yards last year in the Cypress Division.

"I don't think about going both ways as anything more than a sacrifice," Gamecho said. "I just want to be on the football field. We're not scared of anyone."

Gray estimates that 75 percent of his starters will end up playing on both sides of the ball. This year, he has the flexibility to rotate players on defense. "Conditioning is very underrated," Gray said. "The kids have to take it upon themselves in the off-season. Sometimes you don't know until the pads come on."

Perhaps the biggest surprise came with the addition of at least a half dozen players — athletes from other sports — that decided to put the pads on for the first time.

"Kids have been trying to get them out for a couple of years," Gray said. "These are athletic kids, and we have some bodies that we feel good about." P.G. is overall 7-3, 3-3 in league games. Strolling up and down Lighthouse, Alvarado, and Ocean avenues, we notice a lot of kids working, and a lot who are not. That's OK, of course, since those not obviously working are probably computer experts who do things online for fun and profit. Things best we not know about, nor even understand. Pushing a broom, clerking, and waiting tables, we understand. Heck, we've done it!

Back in the good old days, the '40s, with WWII before and after, there was plenty of work around for the local kids, and no child labor laws to get in the way. We started collecting pine cones, used for kindling, and I think we got paid a dime for a gunny sack full. Huckleberries were a little more seasonal and those got us a buck for a quart Mason jar. Believe me, that's a lot of huckleberries.

We moved up the labor ladder to lawns and yard work, and I can tell you that as far as I could discover, nobody in P.G. had a decent, sharp lawn mower. (There's a war on, you know.) But we chewed up the grass, hit the edges with 1915 vintage clippers and earned enough in an afternoon to buy a war stamp or two.

Sooner or later most of us boys got off to a good start in journalism, delivering *The Advertiser, Tide, The Herald* and the San Francisco papers from sea to shining sea. Only two reasons to get out of bed at 4:30 a.m., either paper routes or fishing.

The biggest and best employers were the Forest Hill Hotel and Holman's, and sooner or later most of us swept the walks, washed the windows, stocked the shelves, carried the suitcases, bussed the tables, washed the dishes, raked the yard, carried the trash, and learned the pleasure of good, honest work, as our parents reminded us.

If you were lucky you could clean out boats for Sprague, or you could caddie at the finest nine-hole course in the state. If you couldn't caddie, you could look for golf balls, or you could even unload lumber for the yard by the depot. Good, honest work! And don't forget the soda fountains.

The grocery stores and drug stores on Lighthouse exposed us to either possible future local careers or an 21

urge to continue our educations. I think Bill Hellam, Charlie Higuera, Ken Zug, Vince Bruno, and Clyde Dyke hired and trained more kids than the Works Progress Administration. My golly, the secrets discovered in the back room of a drug store, the thrill of watching Bill Hellam carve up a side of beef, and learning how to snap a folded paper bag open! And with practice you could learn how to imitate a trombone, just like Bill!

One summer, the city of Pacific Grove hired me to fill in wherever needed ... sweeping streets, collecting trash, figuring costs of new curbs and gutters. One fine day I filled the city dump truck with trash from cans all over town. Happily driving the truck back to the corporation yard, pulled into the yard and noticed the truck bed was up! No trash! I had pulled the wrong lever or pushed the wrong button and dumped the collected mess up and down the streets of America's Last Hometown! What to do? Well, it was quitting time. I decided then and there that I had better get serious about an education. Haven't been in a dump truck since!
